Women's ordination around the world

Rev. Florence Li Tim-Oi 1907-1992

Have you ever heard of Florence Li Tim-Oi? In 1944 she was the first women in the Anglican Communion to be ordained to the priesthood. This happened in Macau during WW II. The Church of England began ordaining women priest in March 1994, but few knew that the first Anglican priest was ordained 50 years earlier.

Li Tim-Oi joined the Anglican church as a young student. At her baptism, she chose the name Florence after Florence Nightingale. She was ordained a deacon in 1941 and served a congregation in the Portuguese Colony of Macao. She was not allowed to celebrate the Eucharist because she was a women, although she ministered on a full time basis to all in need.

The Japanese occupation of Hong Kong and World War II made it impossible for priests to get to neutral Macau. This in when the Hong Kong Bishop Raymond Hall wrote to the Archbishop of Canterbury and explained that he was going to allow Tim-Oi to give the sacraments of the Church. After the war, she was asked to relinquish her priest's license but she never renounced her Holy Orders.

Under Mao Tse-Tung churches in China were closed and Tim-Oi was persecuted. The Red Guards cut up her vestments with scissors and humiliated her. She lived in hardship for 30 years. One day Tim-Oi said she was touched by the Holy Spirit, hearing God say to her that she was a priest, and she understood that God would support her through everything.

She was able to move to Canada in 1983 and was appointed as an honorary assistant at a parish in Toronto. The Anglican church of Canada approved the ordination of women to the priesthood by then and in 1984 Florence Li Tim-Oi was reinstated as a priest. It just so happened that it happened on the 40th anniversary of her ordination. She supported other women seeking ordination and was awarded Doctorates of Divinity by General Theological Seminary in New York and Trinity College, Toronto. This helped to convince people that the Holy Spirit was working in and through women priests. She served at the Anglican Cathedral in Toronto until her death. The Episcopal church celebrates January 24 as her feast day in Lesser Feasts and Fasts.

A foundation has been set up in her memory and is a charity helping women in other countries.

Women's Ordination Worldwide (WOW) is an ecumenical network of national and international groups whose primary mission is the admission of roman catholic women to all ordained ministries.
